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Introduction

During the summer and fall of 2005, information was requested from cities, towns, private water companies, and water improvement districts in an effort to summarize and document water conservation activities implemented within Active Management Areas. Eighteen organizations submitted information to be included in the summary. This information will be used as reference material during a review of the Department's municipal water conservation program contained in the Third Management Plan. It also is intended to serve as a resource for municipal water providers and other organizations wishing to begin or expand their water conservation programs. This report will be made available to those who request it. It also will be posted on the Arizona Department of Water Resources website.

Any municipal water provider located in an Active Management Area that did not provide information on their water conservation program during the initial data collection period is invited to do so at any time. Any municipal provider wishing to submit additional and/or updated information about their program also is welcome to do so.

<p>Water Audits for Customers (Only for residents living south of I-10)</p>	<p>Goodyear offers one of the most comprehensive water audit programs in the Phoenix metro area to determine if water is being wasted or can be better conserved.</p> <p>The \$45 Water Audit is completely voluntary and consists of 3 phases:</p> <p>Step 1-Internal audit – conducted by resident on worksheet provided by City. City installs an electronic box to the meter to determine water usage patterns.</p> <p>Step 2 - Electronic Audit – conducted by the City in conjunction with the resident.</p> <p>Step 3 – External Audit – conducted by City field rep and includes inspection of meter box, landscaping systems and inside plumbing to determine if leaks exist.</p> <p>Once the three steps are completed, the Water Management Department will study the data and issue a report suggesting area where water conservation measures can assist in usage reduction.</p>
<p>Water Audits for City facilities</p>	<p>City employees are on continuous watch for water wasting at City facilities and are encouraged to report and take immediate corrective action.</p>

It has a corresponding puppet show, and also reaches approximately 4,000 students per year.</p> <p>-<i>Seventh grade</i> – Focuses on the science of water—the importance of keeping drinking water clean and the economics of water (for example, they have to simulate that they are buying drilling permits to conduct water testing).</p> <p>-<i>Annual art and calendar contest</i> – The City partners with Mesa Public Schools and the Bureau of Reclamation to sponsor the <i>Water—Use it Wisely</i> art contest. Xeriscape Landscape Ordinance	Affects all commercial and multi-family construction projects. The ordinance requires adherence to Xeriscape principles, including limitation on high water-use plantings/features, low water use plant requirements, and appropriate irrigation system design.
Plumbing Code	Requires the use of water-efficient plumbing fixtures including 1.6 gallon per flush toilets, 2.5 gallon per minute showerheads, faucets and showerheads.

Water Waste and Theft	Revised June 2000 with tougher definitions of waste and higher penalties. Initial ordinance established a minimum \$250.00 penalty; \$500 for subsequent occurrences within a three-year period. Penalties can be waived by attending the Water Waste Diversion Program. Violations are currently defined as: (1) Allowing water to escape property, (2) Allowing water to pond greater than ¼ inch, or greater than 150 square feet on any street or parking lot, (3) Washing driveways, sidewalks, parking areas with an open hose/under normal system pressure, (4) Operating misting systems in unoccupied non-residential areas, (5) Operating a permanently installed irrigation system with a broken head or emitter, or a head spraying more than 10% of the spray onto a street or parking lot and (6) Failing to repair a controllable leak.
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EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMS: Tucson Water

Program	Description
Water Smart Landscape Workshops	These two-hour workshops target residential customers. They are held on Saturdays in locations throughout the Tucson basin. Workshops are advertised in water bill inserts. Workshop topics include: (1) Drip Irrigation Design, Installation, and Maintenance, (2) Plant Selection and Design and (3) Irrigation Timer Use and Irrigation Scheduling.
SmartScape Landscaper Workshops	This series of eight workshops is designed to teach landscape professionals, property managers, and homeowner associations about water conservation practices in landscape management.
Low 4 Program	Sponsored by Tucson Water, the Pima County Cooperative Extension offers landscape water conservation programs to commercial users, school districts, and the general public. LOW 4 stands for low cost, low maintenance, low water, and low energy landscapes.
'Da Drops – Grade 3	This program includes a student activity book and supplemental teacher guide for classroom use, followed by a special classroom presentation. It is designed to teach about the water cycle, groundwater, and water distribution.
Our Water, Our Future – Grade 5	This five-unit classroom curriculum packet is followed by a classroom presentation. The program is designed to teach students about the water cycle, water supply, and water quality.

Tucson Toolkit – Grades 7-8	This is a five-unit student activity book and supplemental teacher guide. It is designed to teach about the water cycle, water quality, and water conservation. An optional home-audit classroom research project is available.
High School Program	The program is designed to bring water studies into broader curricular areas by building capacity among teachers and encouraging students to develop water-related projects. It includes a teacher internship program: a two-week paid internship offered to high school teachers. Teachers are provided with tours of facilities, presentations on related issues, and job-shadowing opportunities. Development of classroom materials and assistance with development of subsequent elements are work products of this program.
Education Outreach	The education outreach program provides classroom presentations and tours, and supports other education related programs. The Wetlands Program provides tours and classroom presentations that help students understand wastewater treatment, recharge, and conservation. Student projects are encouraged through regional Science Fair awards, the River of Words poetry contest and a Water Expo.

Program	Description
Pamphlets and Brochures	A variety of pamphlets and brochures are distributed to Tucson Water customers throughout the year.
Public Service Announcements	Tucson Water produces PSAs containing water conservation messages to air on local broadcast media.
Community Events	Water conservation information is provided at various civic, trade and neighborhood events throughout the year.
Beat the Peak Program	This program informs water customers of the special need to conserve water during peak delivery periods.
