Gentlemen:

Reference is made to your telegram dated January 11, 1934, which reads as follows: "To insure prompt slaughtering sheep from reservation necessary arrangements with killing gang in advance. If possible, would appreciate your wiring collect if any shipments in transit or when next shipment will be made."

This is to advise that there are no sheep at the present time in transit from Leupp, Western Navajo and Hopi jurisdictions. I have no means of knowing as to when shipments will be made from the Eastern Navajo jurisdiction, Crown Point, New Mexico; Northern Navajo jurisdiction, Shiprock, New Mexico; or the Southern Navajo jurisdiction, Fort Defiance, Arizona, as the superintendents of these jurisdictions are responsible for the shipment of their sheep. Western Navajo jurisdiction, Tuba City, Arizona; Hopi jurisdiction, Keams Canyon, Arizona; and Leupp ship through Winslow, Arizona. When shipments are made through Winslow, it will be possible for me to advise you within 24 hours in advance of such shipments. We appreciate the advantage to you of knowing in advance the number of sheep that will be coming in and will be glad to cooperate with you in every way possible.

A copy of this letter is being sent to Superintendent John G. Hunter, Fort Defiance, Arizona, Superintendent S. F. Stacher, Crown Point, New Mex., and Superintendent E. R. McCray, Shiprock, New Mexico, for their information and guidance.
