I, Jimpah, a Navajo Indian woman, was born about three miles south of Dilkon, Arizona. When the Navajos were taken to Bosque Rodondo I was a large girl, almost grown. We were taken to Bosque Rodondo from this vicinity, and upon returning we lived near the same place. I have lived here all my life. At the time of returning from Bosque Rodondo I was issued two sheep and also two sheep for my small baby; one year later we were issued one more sheep each. I was allotted here; my children were allotted nearby. When I was young, and for a long time after we returned from Bosque Rodondo, there were no white men in this country.
