


I, Hash Ka Shi Nelth Tsa, a Navajo Indian, was born near Black Rock; about thirty eight years ago; and have lived in that vicinity ever since. I was given an allotment about nineteen years ago, near Black Rock. At the time I was given the allotment there were no white men there, nor had there ever been white men living or using land in this vicinity. After I had been allotted, two white men came with cattle, and tried to drive me away, threatening me with guns, but I did not leave. I have seven children, who have no allotments; my wife has an allotment near mine. A year ago I had over two hundred sheep; I lost over one hundred, and have about one hundred left. The range has been good this summer, but has been very poor for ten years prior to now. If I am deprived of this range, I have no idea where I could go with my sheep.
