Dear Mr. Gould:

I am writing a short line to let you know that I have a very important problem that I wish to send the Commissioner of Indian Affairs thru you. I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for the past favors and I hope and pray that this be present to him.

In 1920 the 21 of May, my brothers complete the house at what is called Comar Springs for the purpose of establishing a cattle ranch. For ten year the ranch house stood, then we received a note from an official, Mr. H. H. Fisk, ordering us out of the place as this was in the Navajo territory, but so far as I know this was within the Hopi Indian Reservation.

Now that the boundary question is being settled between the Hopi and Navajo, I feel that I humbly ask his honor to heed to my plea, that I be allowed to repossess what once belong to my family.

There is to be a Hopi-Navajo counsel held at the Hopi Agency at Keams Canon, Arizona, on April 4, 1933, and so I expect to hear from the secretary by that time.

I hope you have had a pleasant winter. We have had an awful cold one, but snow is all gone now.
