Dear Mr. Dickson:

A man named Hodes Chat-thli came to me yesterday and related the following alleged facts---that he had been compelled by certain Indians to leave the Leupp Reservation about Tolchaco and to come onto the Moqui Reserve to live. The trouble was over grass and water, etc. He has removed to the country around Cemar Spring and Tallyhogan, this reserve, and wishes to send his two children (girls) to the Keams Canon School. These two girls are now enrolled at Leupp, and are named--so he says--
Lena
Bahe-yazza and *Alice*
Kenuz-pah.

I told the man that if the Navajoes of the Cemar Spring and Tallyhogan district did not object to his presence, I would not; and he was vouched for by the Chief of police and others. I told him I would take his two girls into this school, providing you had no objection. Will you please inform me about this. I am not scouring around for pupils, because I could not care for the Navajoes of this reserve if I had twice as large dormitories; but under the circumstances, if you have no objection, I will endeavor to care for this man's two girls.
